Addresses climate change and resiliency

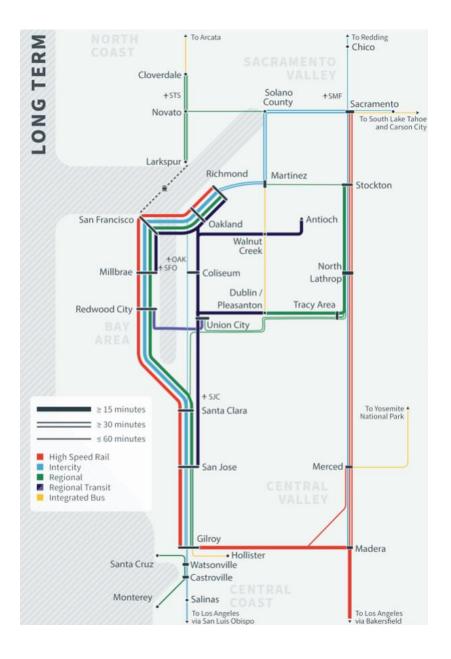

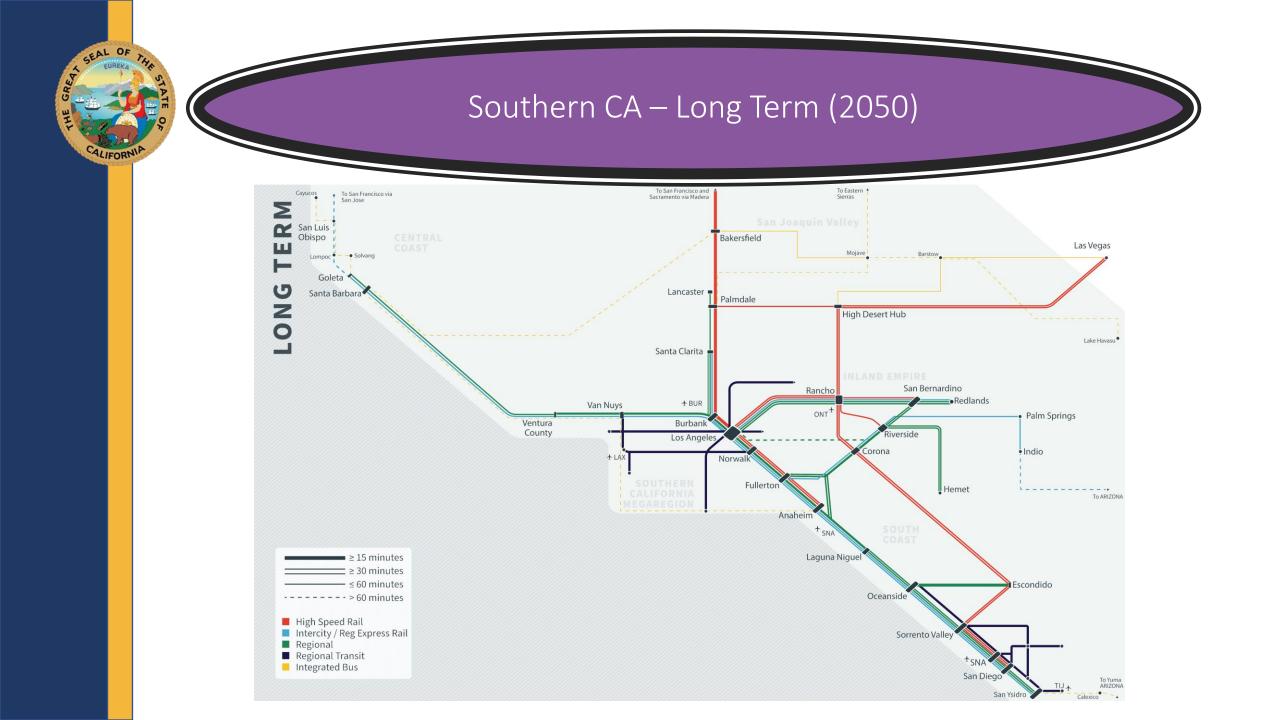
Highlights transition to zero emission operations by 2035

Contactless, open-loop payments

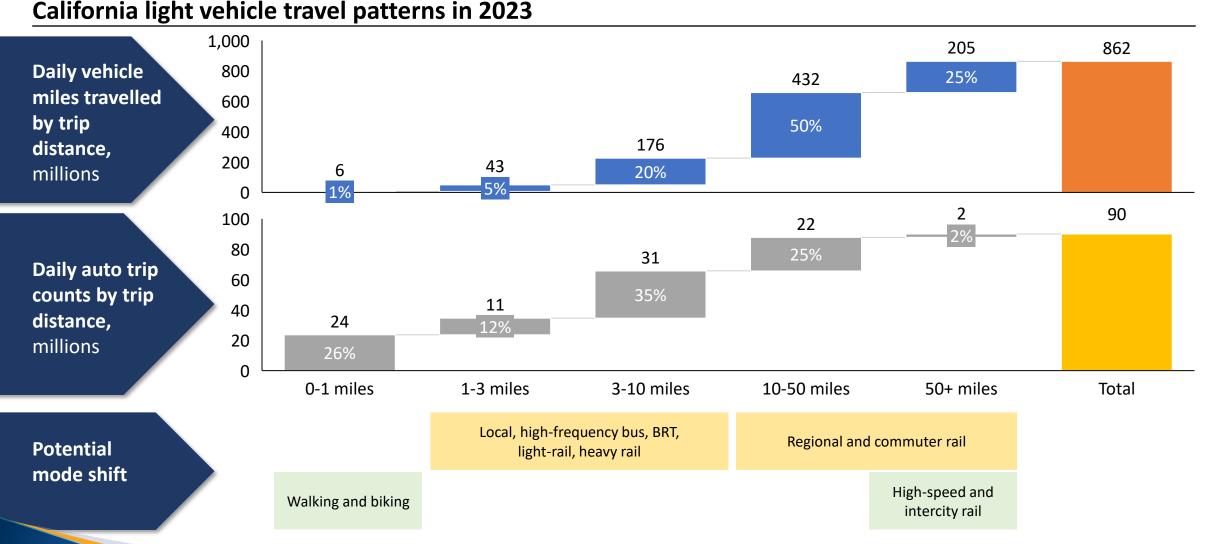








Longer Distance Travel is Key to Significant Mode Shift, But Must Be Integrated with Local Transit
