Sutanto Soehodho, Professor, University of Indonesia (Panelist)
Former Deputy Governor of DKI Jakarta for Trade, Industry and Transportation

Professor Sutanto Soehodho graduated from University of Indonesia in 1986 for his bachelor degree in Civil Engineering. He then pursued his further studies in Japan at Tokyo University where he earned his master degree in 1989 and doctoral degree in 1992. He has been working with the University of Indonesia since 1986 as lecturer, then Director of graduate studies at Faculty of Engineering (1997-1999), Head of Civil Engineering Department (1999-2001), and Vice President of the university (2002-2007). He was also appointed as Deputy Governor of Jakarta for Trade, Industry and Transportation in 2008 to 2019. As professional engineer Professor Sutanto was also appointed as Director of Distribution at Cement Industry of PT Cement Cibinong then Holcim (1995-1997), Chairman of Jakarta Urban Transport Council/DTKJ (2004-2008), member of Public Policy Committee at Ministry of State Owned Enterprises (2014-2018), President Commissioner of Jakarta Mass Transit Company/PT MRTJ (2009-2013). Along his career he has also been active in some consulting works, active member of Indonesia Road Development Association (IRDA/HPJI), founding member of EASTS (eastern asia society for transportation studies) as well as Indonesia Transport Society/MTI, member of WCTR society (world conference on transport research), President of Japan Society for Civil Engineers (JSCE) of Indonesia Chapter, invited guest to IHRA's meetings and seminars (international high-speed rail association), Reviewer of International Association of Traffic Safety and Sciences (IATSS Journal), and Transportation Research Journal Elsevier. His academic career includes also experiences of being visiting researcher and scholar at Leeds University (UK), University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, Purdue University, University of California at Berkeley (USA), and KTH-Stockholm (Sweden).
